WHERE CREDIT BELONGS.

Facts are facts, and truth must prevail. There is nothing gained by misrepresentation. Consequently when the Mountaineer credits Judge Blakeley with having raised county warrants to par, that paper placed credit where it does not belong. "Four years ago," says the Mountaineer, "Wasco county warrants were discounted from 10 to 15 cents." This is not the fact. Dr. Logan, who is one of the heaviest warrant buyers of the county, says that in 1892 warrants were at par. In 1893, (by the way, under Blakeley's administration) they fell to 90 cents, and for very small amounts, even as low as 85 cents. The CHRONICLE is not so unfair as to charge this deterioration to Judge Blakeley's incumbency in office, and is perfectly satisfied to give the true reason. It is this. In 1893 was the great panic, when banks were daily bursting all over the country, and the money market was congested to a particularly aggravating degree. Everyone knows that cash was the scarcest of all commodities, consequently county warrants were not bought unless under the most alluring offers. Let us reason together. The Mountaineer says.

Four years ago Wasco county warrants were discounted from 10 to 15 per cent. People who performed

services for the county were compelled to take 85 and 90 cents on the dollar for their work. Now they get dollar for dollar, are paid in full for their work. Why is this? Because the management of county affairs is conducted on business principles. Those who perform any service for the county will therefore re elect Judge Blakeley.

Now if warrants bring par at the present time, and only brought 85 to 90 cents four years ago, there must be a reason for it, and that reason must be a vast reduction in the county debt. The facts are that the county debt is a trifle in excess of what it was in 1892. The figures on file at the clerk's office showing the net liabilities are as follows:

Perhaps the best evidence as to why Wasco county warrants bring par would be that of Judge Blakeley himself. He has often expressed himself at the clerk's office, and said that the county clerk, Mr. A. M. Kelsay, is to be credited for warrants selling at par. It was Mr. Kelsay who found a market in Portland for our warrants, when they were selling at 90 to 95 cents, believing that warrant holders were entitled to face value if there was a possible way of securing it. He therefore found warrant buyers in Portland who would pay 97 to 98, forcing local buyers to bid par value for them.

THE CHRONICLE therefore respectfully represents that warrants were at par four years ago; that the panic reduced them as it reduced all other values; that there is no logical reason for warrants to be higher than in 1892 because the county debt is about the same; and that if credit is due any county officer, it is due Mr. Kelsay for forcing warrant buyers to pay face value for them.

A business view of the congressional situation is thus outlined by the Commercial Review, a leading trade paper of Portland: "In this (second) congressional district the Republicans have nominated a staunch protectionist in William R. Ellis. Two of his competitors are known as free traders, and the other, H. H. Northrup, who has come out as an independent candidate at the instigation of Messrs. Scott and Simon to defeat Mr. Ellis, will cut no figure outside of Multnomah county. He will hardly get enough votes to do Mr. Ellis any injury. The business men from the Second congressional district will not throw their votes away on him, especially the wool men, and all will work for Mr. Ellis' re-election. We do not want a free trader. We must have a high tariff candidate, and the citizens of this district know that Mr. Ellis is their friend and will increase his majority of two years ago."

THE Japanese have again given evidence of their practical ideas. Instead of presenting medals to the soldiers who especially distinguished themselves in the late war with China, the government has purchased 18,000 watches, at \$2.50 each, in Switzerland, which will be given to the brave fellows.
