amount has been appropriated to complete it, and the appropriation is immediately available. The present season will see the work completed, and the Inland Empire will take its proper place in the great world of commerce.

A week's work of congress is summed up in the advancement of three appropriation bills, the final passage of one, and the adoption of the bill to exclude illiterate immigrants by the house. The act to restrict immigration in the case of males of mature age to persons who can read and write the English or some other language was first amended to exclude aliens who retain their homes in some foreign country. This is aimed at the French Canadıans, who flock into New England and the cities along our lakes, to earn and save the high wages we pay, and then return to their villages in Quebec. It will involve some nice distinctions as to what constitutes a home in a foreign country, and probably will break down under the interpretation of the courts, which rarely sympathize with such restrictions. The main provision of the bill is harmless, because it presents no real check to desirable immigration. Those who wish to come will soon master the arts of reading and writing, if they have them not already. Neither will it check the undesirable immigration of anarch-ists and socialists, who are generally educated up to the higher average of the working classes of northern ready. 
