The enactment of the Australian system was a great advance in the direction of good government. Intelligence is a necessary element in the process of voting, which was far from being the case under the old procedure. Men who have dabbled in politics of the grosser sort have seen the effects of this law in making the vote of the ignorant uncertain, and thus lessening the amount of money illegitimately spent at general elections. Political ingenuity has, however, so disciplined by organization the ignorant voting class that the influence of the politician has to a greater or less extent been made to extend to the voting booth. Especially is this so when, through the tack of a registration law, voters can be imported from outside places and more than that, can be made to vote several times at the same election by appearing in different wards. A law which would compel all voters to be registered ten days or two weeks before election, would in a measure put an end to the iniquitous practice of trading in votes.

This subject has already received some agitation through the press of the state, and the sentiment is strongly expressed in favor of such legislation. THE CHRONICLE hastens to join in the demand for a registry law, and feels safe in saying that the members of the legislature from Wasco county will be found working to such an end.


