Spanish Outrages.

An American citizen writing to a friend at Key West, Florida, gives an account of outrages perpetrated on Cuban women who obeyed Weyler's order, requiring them to present themselves at the Spanish forts and camps. He was an eye-witness of one of the outrages. Recently, Senora Martinez and her 15-year-old daughter appeared at a Spanish camp. After addressing insulting remarks to them, the officer in command tore the clothing from the girl and exposed her to the soldiers. Then at the point of the bayonet, the nude girl was forced to march in front of the column of troops. To escape dishonor by the Spaniards, hundreds of Cuban women are joining the insurgent army.

Sherman county sheep are again being herded on the hills in the upper part of our valley. Fifteen thousand head are reported at the forks of Neal creek, completely wiping out the last bit of range for the stock belonging to the farmers on the East Side. The settlers in the Mt. Hood neighborhood are literally being eaten up by the sheep. A number of the band are also being herded on the reservation at the base of Mt. Hood. One of the sheep owners, when told he was trespassing on the government reserve, haughtily retorted it would take more than President Cleveland's proclamation to keep him off the reserve. 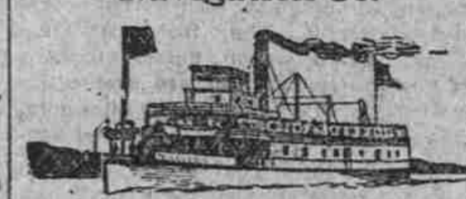
