COMRADES OF WAR

Five Hundred Old Veterans Called on McKinley.

THE REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE

It Will Endeavor to Induce McKinley to Make a Tour of the Western States.

CANTON, July 16.—Five hundred old veterans, comrades of the war, called on Major McKinley this afternoon. They came from Cleveland on a special train and they called to congratulate him as "comrades," and not as Republicans or Democrats, as their spokesman said. Addresses were made by Commander Hugh Bunkley and others. Major McKinley responded in part as follows: "Fellow Citizens. I respond to your call with special gratification. Nothing gives me greater pleasure than to meet at my home my comrades in the civil war. Ties of fraternity and friendship grow stronger and dearer as the years recede and the old guard, one by one, is called home.

"There has been no time since they laid down their arms when we had greater need for patriotic men than now, and a response to the crisis of the hour will now come from all sections of our common country. [Great applause.] We have reached a point in our history when all men who love their country must unite to defeat by their ballot the forces which now assail our country's honor. The struggle, which is upon us, involving national good faith and honor, will enlist their united and earnest services until those who are arrayed against the public faith shall be routed and dispersed. Financial dishonor is the threatened danger now and good men will obliterate lines of party in an united effort to uphold American honor."

THE REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE
 CLEVELAND, July 16.—The national Republican executive committee today

appointed Perry S. Heath, of Cincinnati, as press and literary agent, and appointed a committee, consisting of Hanna, Durking of Indiana, Dawes of Illinois, Perrin of Wisconsin and Heath, to select the offices for the committee in Chicago and New York. This committee will be in Chicago Monday. The committee will visit McKinley at Canton to lay before him the plans outlined and ask his opinion.

After the meeting, Mr. Hanna stated that no action had yet been taken relative to the appointment of the ninth member of the executive committee. It is believed the committee, while at Canton, will endeavor to induce Mr. McKinley to make a trip through the West, or at least to deliver some speeches in that section of the country. Some of the Western committeemen are strongly in favor of having the campaign opened in Omaha or Lincoln, Neb.

MORE BONDS IMMINENT.

Another Sale May Be Expected in the Near Future.

WASHINGTON, July 17.—It is useless to conceal the fact that should the withdrawal of gold continue at the present rate, another bond issue will be necessary to sustain the credit of the government. While the administration has not expected to be able to pull through until March 4 without another sale of bonds, it did hope to defer the issue until late in the fall, or, if possible, to the first of next year. The withdrawals on Monday were \$675,300, of which \$375,000 is for immediate exportation. The balance will probably be hoarded.

The disposition to hoard gold has been notably apparent for several days. On Saturday nearly \$125,000 was drawn for this purpose, and on the day before the withdrawals were nearly \$1,000,000, a large part of which was to be kept in this country.

GOLD AT PORT ANGELES.

Yellow Metal in Paying Quantities Found on the Beach.
 PORT ANGELES, July 17.—Considerable excitement has been created in this city by the announcement that gold has been discovered in the beach sand eight miles east of here. A single pan of the sand yielded 75 colors without the aid of

a magnifying glass, and with an ordinary rocker, it is said that a man can take out \$2 a day.

A rush for claims has been made, and twenty of the most desirable have already been filed upon. Water rights have also been secured, as it is the intention of those who have located claims to use machines for extracting the gold from the sand.

Old settlers say that the beach at this same point was mined for gold twenty years ago, and that at that time miners made good wages. The members of the company organized are W. K. Carl, Alex. Clark, F. P. Fisher, J. D. Hickok and Maurice Fisher. They have all located upon claims and expect to order a Fanta machine, which is an invention made by California parties who now have one in use near La Push and are obtaining splendid results.

A JEALOUS WIFE'S DEED.

Threw Sulphuric Acid in the Face of a Rival.

BUTTE, July 17.—Mrs. Rose Heimback, wife of Ed Heimback of Meaderville, Montana, became jealous of the attention her husband paid to Mrs. Thomas Snelling. Mrs. Heimback, in company with her sister, Mrs. Hoskins, went to the Snelling home today and calling Mrs. Snelling into the parlor, Mrs. Heimback threw a pint of sulphuric acid on her. Mrs. Snelling is terribly burned and will die. Mrs. Heimback and her sister are under arrest. The latter is a raving maniac in the county jail and is expected to die also.

DIPLOMAT WAS CHILLED.

The French Minister at Washington Loved the Highest Place Too Well.

An interesting story is being told in Washington regarding M. Patenotre, the French ambassador. After congress passed the law empowering the president to send ambassadors to such countries as would raise the rank of their representatives, Sir Julian Pauccefote was the first to inform the president of the intention of his country to make him an ambassador. M. Patenotre conceived the ambition to be the dean of the ambassadors and communicated it to his home government, and his commission arrived before Sir Julian's. He went to the state department in the hope of immediate recognition as the first ambassador to this country. He was told that Sir Julian had anticipated him by informing the department of the action of his government. He was angry and wrote to the president requesting his intervention. He received instead a chilly letter from Mr. Gresham.

EXPENSIVE MIRROR.

Will Bring the Moon Within Thirty-Eight Miles of the Eye.

A special train brought into Paris a few days ago, wrapped in heavy felt blankets, bound with soft wood hoops, a rough block of crystal, which is to form the mirror of the huge telescope at the 1900 exhibition. In its present state the piece of glass weighs 6,600 pounds and has already cost \$30,000. It will cost \$30,000 more and take 30 months of polishing by a novel and secret mechanical process before it is finished. Its diameter is nearly seven feet, and it is expected to bring the moon within 38 miles of the eye, but the chief experts of the Paris observatory say that its images will not be so distinct as theirs are now at 94 miles, which they believe is the utmost practicable limit.

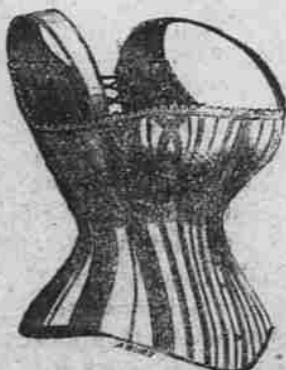
