Will Bring the Moon Within Thirty-Eight Miles of the Eye.

A special train brought into Paris a few days ago, wrapped in heavy felt blankets, bound with soft wood hoops, a rough block of crystal, which is to form the mirror of the huge telescope at the 1900 exhibition. In its present pounds and has already cost \$20,000. It will cost \$30,000 more and take 30 months of polishing by a novel and secret mechanical process before it is finished. Its diameter is nearly seven feet, and it is expected to bring the moon within 38 miles of the eye, but the chief experts of the Paris observatory say that its images will not be so distinct as theirs are now at 94 miles,
