In so small a city as Pendleton the evil results of the silver agitation are made manifest, says the Tribune. A resident of that city was sent \$5000 for investment in Umatilla county warrants, but was immediately telegraphed after the St. Louis populist and silver conventions not to invest another dollar.

Umatilla county warrants are now selling at 98 cents, but it is thought that the present scare will seriously affect the price of city and county securities.

On so small a pretext as the possibility of the triumph of the eilver party, several persons have become so alarmed as to withdraw their small holdings from the banks in Pendleton, which they know will go to a premium in the event of any change from the gold standard. It is the millions of small depositors all over the country who wield a mighty influence over the money market and who mave much to do with fomenting a pantcky feeling through their loss of confidence.

If at this time depositors feel uneasy, it is not impossible to imagine the wild and frantic raid on the banking institutions of the country that would immediately follow the success of a free-coinage ticket.
