THE TEST OF VALUES.
Gold Now Buys Less Labor than 25 Years Ago.

No competent student places the average fall in gold prices from the maximum, about 1873 to 1895, at more than 30 per cent., and this average relates only to commodities, not to services. According to the investigation made by the senate committee on finance with the aid of the national labor bureau, there was an actual advance in wages during that period down to the close of the investigation. Averaging the price of labor with the price of commodities, therefore, the value of gold must have risen very much less than the decline of 30 per cent in commodity prices would indicate. But the main thing is that with respect to labor gold has actually fallen in value. It takes more gold to pay for an hour's labor now than it did 23 years ago. The greater the rise in the value of gold with respect to commodities, therefore, the better for the wage earner, for he can buy the more with the same quantity of gold. While the tabular standard can never be made exact, it is nevertheless useful. From the various tabulations which have been made the conclusion is established beyond all reasonable doubt that the workingman can get more for his wages than he could 25 years ago, while the dollar with which to pay his debt costs him less labor.

A large proportion of the Germans living in the United States were born in the fatherland long enough ago to have seen the effect of free coinage of silver in actual operation. They have been witnesses of the benefits conferred upon the industries and commerce of the new empire by substitution of the gold standard for the silver standard.
The sons of these Germans have profited by the experience of their fathers. There are 1087 papers in the United States in the German language. Of this number there are only forty-seven not advocating maintenance of the existing gold standard, no matter what their party affiliations.
