BLAND'S OUTRAGEOUS ASSERTION.

Richard Parks Bland, substitute jawsmith, stood upon the platform of a railway car yesterday at Altoona, Pa., and told some untruths to the horny-handed sons of toil who had trooped down to the station to stare at young Mr. Bryan. One of the fibs, says the Telegram, uttered by "Silver Dick" was contained in the statement that under the monetary system advocated by him the laboring people of the country would "have plenty of work and not be compelled to tramp for work." Just how such a desirable state of affairs would be brought about by the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1 was not explained, but the bare assertion was of itself sufficient to provoke "great applause and loud cheers."

Before this campaign is over the workmen of Altoona will probably be convinced that they applauded the rankest kind of demagoguery. When the other side of the case is fairly presented to them they may wonder how they could have been so foolish as to approve a statement that was a direct slap at the face of fact and recent experience. They will be made to realize that free silver coinage, instead of stimulating the demand for labor, would throttle the life out of it.

Three years ago those men of Altoona saw finance, commerce and industry violently disturbed by a fear that the government would not be able to maintain gold payments and that our currency would descend to a silver basis. They saw banks failing, great commercial houses unable to meet their obligations, credit seriously impaired, the operations of industry interrupted, mills and factories closed and tens of thousands of laborers thrown out of employment. All that panic and distress was caused by a mere doubt as to

the kind of money we intended to use. What, then, do these workmen of Altoona think would be the consequences of a deliberate determination upon the part of all the people to adopt silver monometalism as a permanent system? What would be the results of the actual passage of a tree coinage law? The imagination can scarcely conceive the deplorable condition of labor that would follow the announcement of such a policy. There is no aspect of the case in which wage-workers have anything to gain by the adoption of a silver standard, but they have everything to lose. They would lose in the value of all their savings, they would lose in the purchasing power of their wages, and, most of all, they would lose by the enforced idleness accompanying the business disturbance and bankruptcy which a radical depreciation of our standard money would create. Unless the laboring man himself can be induced to forge his own chains, the political enslavement proposed by such specious leaders as Bland can never be inaugurated.

There is plenty of money in the country. Vast sums are lying idle because a lack of confidence exists which forbids investment. No one will venture a risk when there is a possibility of receiving but half in return. This quotation from Speaker Reed's opening address illustrates the point, and is worth remembering: "Money always comes with capital. We have money now, more than we can use, lying idle. Money is the transfer of capital, as a hayrack and horse are a transfer of hay. More hayracks will never make more hay, but more hay will require more hayracks, and is sure to get them."
