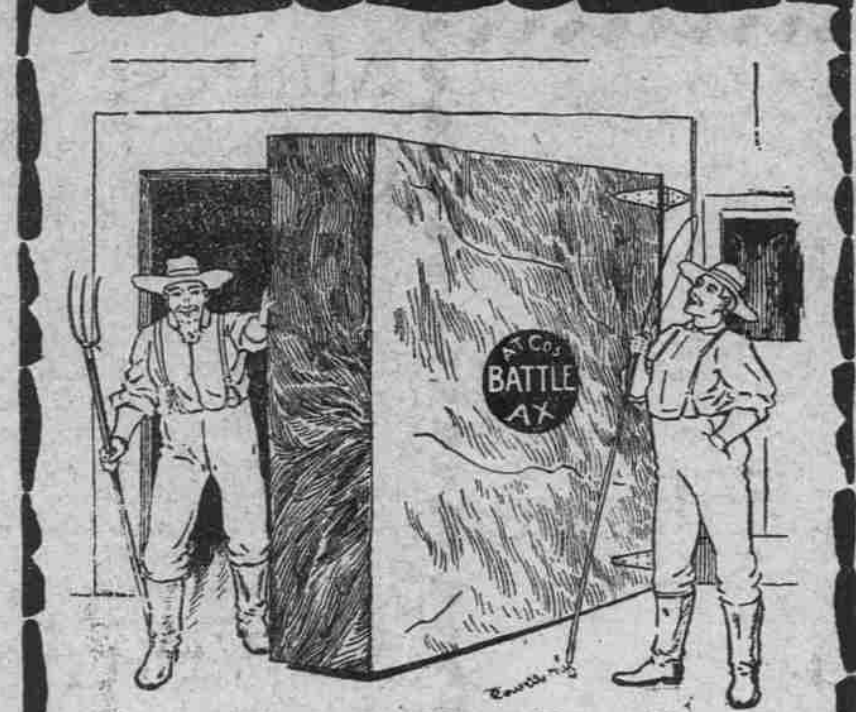
Oregon Jungle Story.
