TILLAMGOK, Or., August 18 .- Charles Lamb, the 9-year-old son of O. C. Lamb, of Vancouver, fell from a high cliff at Netarts yesterday, and the chances for his recovery are doubtful. He was ascending the hill at Maxwell's short beach when he stumbled and fell, rolling over jagged rocks, and falling from shelf to shelf, until his mangled form finally rested on the beach at least 250 feet below. A physician was summoned at once, and it is impossible to determine his chances for recovery at this time. No bones were broken, strange to say, unless his skull is fractured, but he received internal injuries and his face was fearfully lacerated and bruised, and his skull was laid bare in several places. At last accounts the boy was not conscious, but was resting easy.


