SWIFT PIGEONS.

More Than a Mile Made a Minute in a Recent Trial.

Aided by a southerly wind and a perfectly clear sky, the first test of the pigeons which are to represent the first Chicago Homing club in the National federation races this year was a most notable success, says the Chicago Chronicle. The trial was remarkable in more than one feature. Two hundred and eighty-one birds, the largest number which the club has ever liberated from one racing station, made the trip, and of that number every bird was reposing peacefully in its loft by one o'clock in the afternoon. The time made by the first birds to arrive home was the fastest ever made over the course, and represents a speed of more than a mile a

The birds were liberated at Money 42 miles away from the nearest loft, at 7:30 o'clock, and White Wings, owned by L. Verschueren, stepped back in its loft at 8:141/2. White Wings was closely followed by nearly half the flock, and 50 arrivals were reported between 8:15 and 8:17. Inasmuch as every bird spent at least as much as five minutes in circling before starting on a line for home, the speed shown is materially more than a mile in each 60 seconds.

As an illustration of how little even the best fanciers are able to judge of the merits of their own pets, it is interesting to note that White Wings had been considered almost worthless. Only t mouth ago he was flown from Sixty first street, a distance of eight miles to his loft, and took 16 days to make the journey. That was his first trial, and he was sent to Monee Saturday quite as much in the hope that he would be lost as for any other reason.
