Although he has spent considerable time traveling through the Eastern states since the adjournment of congress and encountered many a hot wave, he looks the picture of health, and as he expresses it will be in excellent trim for the fall campaign in which he hopes to take an active part. Notwithstanding his reputed silver proclivities, he is a McKinley man, and wears a McKinley and Hobart button. It is his purpose to stump the state for the Republican nominees and tell the people in plain words why it is for the best interest of the country to elect McKinley. The indications in the East, he says are decidedly in favor of the election of the Ohio statesman, as the free-silver craze in many places has run its race. People are coming back to their sober senses and studying the situation with more calmness and deliberation.
