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A SOUND-MONEY RALLY

Reed Addresses Many Thousands and Maine Republicans.

DEMOCRATIC RULE DENOUNCED

Causes of Present Industrial Depression Clearly Set Forth—The Ex-Speaker Well Received.

OLD ORCHARD, Me., Aug. 25.—The Republicans of Maine, according to custom, held a grand rally here this afternoon, at which were gathered thousands from all over the state, as well as from other parts of New England. Among the speakers were Hon. Thomas B. Reed and Hon. Lee Fairchild.

Mr. Reed's appearance was the signal for a wild demonstration from the enthusiastic crowd which lasted for several minutes. At its close Mr. Reed thanked the people for the flattering reception tendered him, and then proceeded with his discussion of the political issues of the day.

In conclusion Mr. Reed said: "These financial matters are governed by natural laws and take their course like the rolling of the round earth or the glitter of the stars. Suppose a man was created full grown and set upon a solitary earth facing the dawn. As the panorama of sunrise, the march of the fountain of light across the sky, the red sunset and the black darkness came over him, what could he make of this termination of this gorgeous pageantry of the skies? Nothing but darkness, desolation and death and a wild calling on the unknown God to help. But the man who has from earliest boyhood seen the sun disappear into its bed to peep up another day, may be ignorant of Kepler's law and of Galileo's faith, but he knows no greater certainty on earth than that the day follows night.

"A man who has only seen 1893 might well wonder and call for rescue, but who who have seen 1873 and have read of 1825 and 1851 in England and 1837 in America, know that we shall as assuredly rise again in business and prosperity as that the sun shall rise.

Be not deceived by a false prophet. In the West they tell the people that Maine is faltering. You and I know she never was so steadfast. Here in the East they tell us the West is blazing with silver crosses and is crowned with silver thorns, but when the tug of battle comes the gallant West, peopled by our children, will show to the world that brothers true and tried who have fought so many fights, shoulder to shoulder in the great conflict of human progress, will never be separated from each other or from that great party round which clustered all the glories of the most illustrious years of this country's history."

HOKE SMITH'S PLANS.

Will Make a Few Campaign Speeches in Georgia.

WASHINGTON, August 25.—Secretary Smith said today: "I will retire from office September 1. It is my purpose to return to Atlanta at once. My resignation was due alone to the fact that I intend to support Bryan and Sewall. I have always voted the regular Democratic ticket, and shall make no exception this year. It is my purpose to devote my time to the practice of law and my private business. I have, however, signified my willingness to make two or three speeches in Georgia for the state and national ticket, but my professional and private business will not permit me to enter actively into the campaign outside my own state."

FUSION IN MISSOURI.

Democratic Committee Trying Hard to Unite Silver Forces.

St. Louis, Aug. 25.—The Republic (Dem.) says: "Fusion in the doubtful counties is to be made the order of the day by Democrats of this state. It is the intention of the state committee to bring about a union of Democrats, free-silver Republicans and Populists in every county where the Republicans cannot be otherwise routed.

"There are twenty-three counties con-

sidered reliably Republican. Figuring has shown that out of these eight counties could be certainly carried by fusion of the elements opposed to Republican rule, and four could be carried with a better organization than the Democrats had in 1892. If fusion is brought about in the Republican counties, as it bids fair to be, the Republicans will not be able to carry half of them, and there will not be the slightest chance of the legislature being captured by them.

"The election of a United States senator to succeed Vest comes up this session, and a harder fight is going to be made than has characterized any campaign in recent years. Fusion means that under no circumstances can the Republicans elect a majority of the legislature, and it means the re-election of Senator Vest and the blasting of the hopes of Chauncey I. Filley, the Republican leader, who is understood to aspire to the place."

Appeal to Bimetallic Union.

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—An address was issued today to the "friends of bimetallicism in the United States," signed by A. J. Warner, president of the American Bimetallic Union, and George E. Bowen, secretary. After declaring the importance of the silver question, in the present campaign, the address says:

"The contest is now on, and it can only be settled at the polls. To the end that the decision may be right the American Bimetallic Union strongly urges the formation of silver clubs and leagues in every state, county, city, town and school district in the Union. To all interested in the cause we say, 'organize and we will assist you to the best of our ability.' Our means are limited and the wealth of the country is arrayed almost solidly against us, but we will aid in the work of organization and education to the utmost of our ability. Such literature as can be furnished free we will provide gratuitously and that which necessarily involves expense will be sent at cost. In every legitimate way we will assist in the disseminating of correct information upon this subject, the correct solution of which means so much to the people of our common country."

Whitney-Vanderbilt.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 25.—The wedding of Miss Gertrude Vanderbilt, the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, to Mr. Harry Payne Whitney, the eldest son of former Secretary of the Navy W. C. Whitney, took place at noon today at "The Breakers," the Vanderbilt summer residence. The wedding was in a way a disappointment to society here, owing to its simplicity. Mr. Vanderbilt's physicians thinking it unwise for him to undergo anything but the quietest ceremony, therefore outside the immediate bridal party, only about 50 persons were present.

The legal marriage ceremony was performed by Rev. George F. Magill, D. D., rector of Trinity church, of which Mr. Vanderbilt is a member. Bishop Potter delivered the benediction. The bride and her attendants assembled in the upper hall and proceeded down the grand stairway. The bride entered the room on the arm of Mr. Chauncey M. Depew and proceeded to the parlor, where she was met by the groom. Miss Vanderbilt was given away by her father, who was wheeled into the room in a reclining chair.

Mitchell Sold for McKinley.

Senator John H. Mitchell for a while will be the guest of his daughter, Mrs. Robert P. Helmbold, at 561 Irving street. Although he has spent considerable time traveling through the Eastern states since the adjournment of congress and encountered many a hot wave, he looks the picture of health, and as he expresses it will be in excellent trim for the fall campaign in which he hopes to take an active part. Notwithstanding his reputed silver proclivities, he is a McKinley man, and wears a McKinley and Hobart button. It is his purpose to stump the state for the Republican nominees and tell the people in plain words why it is for the best interest of the country to elect McKinley. The indications in the East, he says are decidedly in favor of the election of the Ohio statesman, as the free-silver craze in many places has run its race. People are coming back to their sober senses and studying the situation with more calmness and deliberation. He basis his hopes for the election of McKinley on the intelligence of the average American voter, and says when the votes are counted it will be seen that there are not so many fools as the Bryan following would have people to believe.

Senator Mitchell will devote some little time to the arrangement of his business affairs, but when the campaign opens in Oregon, he will be found in the front ranks for McKinley and the Republican party.

The Eve of Battle at Boise.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 25.—The two factions of the Republicans will meet in separate conventions here tomorrow. The spirit seems to be irremedial. Each side will name a full state ticket if the programme is carried out. The silver men will endorse the Bryan electors named by Democrats and the McKinley men will put up a straight McKinley electoral ticket. Senators Dubois and Shoup are here leading their respective sides of the fight.

By order of the Common Council of Dalles City, made on the 3d day of August, 1896, and entered of record in the records of Dalles City on the 4th day of August, 1896, notice is hereby given that the sidewalks on the following streets have been declared dangerous by said council on said 3d day of August, and the said Common Council will proceed to make the improvements as hereinafter stated, on said streets, or parts of streets, so declared dangerous, after fourteen days from the first publication of this notice, to-wit, August 7, 1896; and the cost of such improvements of all such sidewalks, and of each of them, will be charged and levied upon the property adjacent thereto and directly benefited thereby, as by charter provided.

The sidewalks declared dangerous and about to be built are as follows, to-wit:

1. To build a sidewalk on the west side of Court street from Second street to the alley, along lot 5 in block 4.
2. To build a sidewalk on the south side of Second street, between Court and Union streets, along lot 3 in block 6.
3. To build a sidewalk on the north side of Second street from Union street east 72 feet, along lot 8 in block 4, and on Union street from Second street to the alley, along lot 8, in block 4.
4. To build a sidewalk on the north side of Fourth, along the property now occupied by W. E. Garretson.
5. To build a sidewalk on the north side of Fourth street, along lot 4 in block 2.
6. To build a sidewalk on the north side of Third street, along lot 6 in block 5, and on the west side of Washington street, along lot 6 in block 5, from Third street to alley.
7. To build a sidewalk on the north side of Alford street along lots 3 and 4, in block 2, between Laughlin and Federal streets.
8. To build a sidewalk on the east side of Washington street, along lot 12 in block A, and on the north side of Fulton street, along lots 9, 10, 11 and 12, in block A.
9. To build a sidewalk on the north side of Second street, between Washington and Court streets, along lot 9, in block 3.

All of said sidewalks will be built and constructed in accordance with the provisions of the charter and ordinances of Dalles City.
