A Temperance Deed.
In looking over the records in Crook county the editor of the Prineville Review found the following conditions in a deed to a piece of land deeded to the First Baptist church of Mitchell: "The condition upon which the said premises are granted are such that if the above-named Baptist church shall sell or permit to be sold upon said premises any malt, or intoxicating liquors, then this deed shall be null and void, and the premises herein described then and immediately revert to the above-named grantor, his heirs and assigns." A deed of such wording is no curiosity in the Wasco county court house. Many of the registries of real estate transfers from various parts of the county are similarly worded.
