Continuing arrivals of gold have raised the treasury reserve about \$125,-000,000, strengthened the banks and relaxed the stringency in commercial loans, so that at about 1 per cent lower rates more business was done than in three previous weeks. Hoarding is no longer reported, but same hoards are being unlocked.

The movement of crops continues large, and purchasers for exports have advanced prices or prevented depression. great, it seems clear that, for the first time in many months, there is some gain. An important change is the general advance in produce, and especially in wheat, which rose sharply on Thursday and Friday, closing 516c higher for the week, with much buying, apparently for foreign account.

Reports of crops abroad were supposed to be the chief cause, as visible supplies in this country increased largely; but for the first time since July, receipts fell below those of the same week last year. They are still large, and for the first quarter of the crop thus far have been 52,721,158 bushels against 40,414,351 last year, a gain of about 30 per cent, and it is conceivable but cannot be considered quite probable that such receipts have come from a crop smaller than last year's, although prices averaged 101/2c in July and 6.8 lower in August than last year.






