Safe for McKinley.

Discussing the situation as it exists today in Oregon, Mr. Sol Hirsch, chairman of the Republican state central committee, says:

"There need be no fear as to the result in Oregon, and absurd reports started by the Bryan people will have no effect upon the great mass of people."

HARD ON CATS.

A French Government Commissioner censures the Conduct of Official Cats.

The French government has just had occasion to appoint a commission to inquire into the grievances of the cats in its employ. Their report is an amusing exhibition of official stupidity, and will rouse a righteous indignation in the bosom of all friends of the useful mouser.

It appears that cats are kept in some of the French military magazines to keep down the surplus population of rats and mice. Their food is regulated by ministerial decree according to circumstances, and at present there is a regulation in force authorizing an expenditure of 2½ centimes per cat per diem. But this does not seem enough, as the unfortunate governmental cats have grown extremely thin, so at last the ministry appointed specialists to inquire into the matter. These have gravely reported that "the cats of the army are very slow to acoustom themselves to the diet prescribed by the government circular. Thus they seldom eat bread, and never lap up greasy water unless actually driven thereto by pangs of hunger, so that they are dying off or else abandoning the military magazines."

LIFE IN GREAT CITIES.

It is Less Enervating Than That in Isolated Communities. And as to the tendency of the growth of great cities to enervate nations, there is no proof of it at all, unless we identify the life of great cities with the passion for idleness and pleasure and self-indulgence which sometimes, but by no means universally, accompanies their growth, says the London Spectator. When you get a large proletariat, living, as that of ancient Rome and possibly of Nineveh and Babylon did, on the alms of the rich and powerful, then no doubt you have the conditions of a thoroughly unnatural and unhealthy life, and no one can wonder at the rapid decay of such cities and of the nations which gloried in them. But where the honest working class far outnumber the proletariat, where the middle classes of distributors and manufacturers and professional men are laborious and energetic, and even the class that lives on its accumulated wealth contains a considerable sprinkling of serious and disinterested workers, we do not believe that there is the smallest evidence of any greater danger in the life of the agricultural village or the pastoral tribe. Indeed, we should regard Olive Schreiner's picture of the life of the modern Boers as indicating a condition of things more prolific of morbid elements, with its almost complete absence of any stirring or active intelligence, than any kind of modern life that is honestly laborious at all. The Boer life is too sleepy, too destitute of stirring thought or effort, to be altogether natural. It needs at least the old element of danger and necessary vigilance to render it even bracing.

NOTICE.

All of said sidewalks and crosswalks will be built and constructed in the manner provided by the charter and ordinances of Dalles City. Dated this 8th day of October, 1896. GILBERT W. PHELPS, Recorder of Dalles City.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: By order of the Common Council of Dalles City, made on the 3d day of October 1896, and entered of record in the records of Dalles City, on the 4th day of October 1896, notice is hereby given that the crosswalks and sidewalks on the following streets or parts of streets have been declared dangerous by said Common Council on said 3d day of October, and the said Common Council will proceed to make the improvements as hereinafter designated, on said streets or parts thereof so declared dangerous after 14 days from the first publication of this notice to-wit: October 8th, 1896, and the cost of such improvement of all crosswalks and of each of them, will be charged and levied upon the corner lots cornering upon the street or streets intersected by such crosswalks, and upon all lots or parts thereof, to the center of each block cornering upon such intersection, each lot to pay that portion of the entire cost that its street frontage upon the intersecting street bears to the street frontage of all lots to be assessed upon said streets, and the cost of all sidewalks and of each of them respectively will be charged and levied upon the property adjacent thereto and directly benefited thereby, as provided by the charter and ordinances of Dalles City.

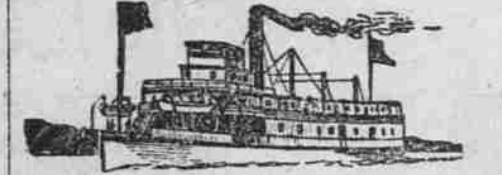
The crosswalks and sidewalks declared dangerous and about to be improved and built are as follows:

- To build a sidewalk on the south side of Fourth street along lots 5 and 6, in block 3, in Trevitt's addition to Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk on the east side of Court street between Second and Third streets, along the south 20 feet of lot 5 in block 5, Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk on Court street between First and Second street along the south 30 feet of lot 1 in block 4, Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk along lot 5 in block 2, on the north side of Alford street, in Fulton's addition to Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk along lots 2 and 3, in block 2, on the north side of Alford street, in Fulton's addition to Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk along lot 6, in block 11, on Union street in Gates' addition to Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk along lots 1 and 2, in block 5, on Fourth street in Trevitt's addition to Dalles City.
- To build a crosswalk on the east side of Court street across Fourth street.
- To build a crosswalk across Jefferson street on the north side of Second street.
- To build a crosswalk across Third street on the east side of Court street.
- To build a crosswalk across Washington on the south side of Fourth street.
- To build a crosswalk across Fulton street on the west side of Federal street.
