A DEMOCRAT'S VIEWS.

Hon. Benton Killen, who was in the city yesterday shaking hands with his many old friends, was seen by a representative of THE CHRONICLE and asked to express his views upon the present political situation. He said:

"I am, and always have been, a Union man. I gave three years of my life to the preservation of the Union, and I feel that I have a considerable interest in this nation and its honorable perpetuation. I am not a protectionist, but there are issues in this campaign which put the tariff question entirely in the shade. As a veteran and a Democrat I cannot support Bryan, and I believe his election would be a most serious calamity. I notice that every Democrat who has anything or expects to have anything, who is anybody or expects to be anybody, is against Bryan. Every man who has nothing and expects to have nothing, or is nobody and who expects to continue a nobody, is for Bryan. I do not wish to take Judge Shattuck, Judge Bellinger or Judge Field by the throat, as Senator Tillman, the great Populist, declares that he and his associates will do. I do not wish to see property destroyed, and men engaged in the government's business mobbed and murdered without calling out the troops. At Chicago the mob was shooting the dinner buckets out of men's hands as they went to and from their work. Cleveland called out the troops, and I will stand by him. I find some Democrats who think Bryanism is Democracy, but by a trick it has been so arranged in this state that I cannot vote for Bryan for president without voting for Watson, an out and out Populist, for vice-president, and certainly no Democrat is under obligation to vote for Watson. The nation will go overwhelmingly against Bryan, and Oregon must be, and will be, in the ranks of law and order."

Mr. Killen believes the only way to restore the Democratic party to its former position of influence is to so vote as to make the defeat of Bryanism complete. His words are full of wisdom, and will influence many to leave the Populist camp. They should be heeded by every true Democrat.

The wholesale business houses of Portland and of all the other northern cities, are almost unanimously opposed to the election of Bryan, and what is the reason? It is because, as business men, experienced and careful, they know that Bryan's election would mean a practical cessation of business for some months and a very great contraction in business thereafter, and until another change of administration.

Mr. Bryan is now devoting his talents to denouncing ex-President Harrison and other Republican campaigners. There is no better evidence of his own hopelessness, for he, as well as anyone, knows that this will gain no votes for him. But it is no doubt some satisfaction to sputter over his certain defeat.

With McKinley elected president, the locks at the Cascades opened to commerce, and the price of wheat at 65 or 70 cents, the people of Wasco county can return thanks on the last Thursday in November with a heartiness never before known.

One more week and then we begin a period of prosperity unknown since March, 1893.

E. HOFFER DENOUNCED.

Salem Typographical Union Warns Men Against Him.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 25.—Salem Typographical Union, No. 210, considers E. Hofer, candidate for presidential elector on the fusion ticket, an enemy to labor unions and labor in general.

The union has adopted resolutions condemnatory of Mr. Hofer, and gives its reasons therefor. Prefatory to the resolutions adopted, it is set forth that Candidate Hofer, as editor and proprietor of the Salem Capital Journal, has, for many years, worked employes at starvation prices.

The union charges that about one week ago, Candidate Hofer discharged a typesetter, a man of family whom he had been paying \$6 per week, and hired two in his stead, paying one \$3.50 per week and the other \$1.50; that three other typesetters who have worked years at the business get only \$4 per week each, another \$1 per week, and a pressman \$3 per week, making a total of \$21 per week for seven people, or an average of \$3 per week. It is charged that for foreman, a "rat" is employed at \$10 per week.

Referring to Hofer's treatment of employes, the resolutions adopted and the concluding words of the preamble, are as follows:

"The sweatshops of New York cannot be worse. His employes are all poor people and depend upon their wages for their bread. One young woman keeps herself and aged mother upon \$4 per week, and a man and his wife subsist on \$3.50 per week. These are truths of record; therefore be it

"Resolved, that we denounce such damnable suppression of the poor laborers and refuse to support any man that is responsible for it. We, therefore, ask the laboring classes and unions to join with us in the defeat of Mr. Hofer for presidential elector."
