Terrible Accident on the O. R. & N.

At about 10 o'clock Tuesday morning the O. R. & N. freight train No. 21 was wrecked a few miles east of Wallula. With the train running at full speed the engine, No. 136, struck a defective rail on a hillside grade, and a moment later the whole train was in ruins and the lives of two men crashed cut. Owing to the accident baving taken place several miles distant from a telegraph office it is difficult to obtain positive information. It is reported that the fireman, named Carpenter, and the brakeman, Roy Williams, were killed. Carpenter was found crushed to death between the engine and tender soon after the accident happened, but the body of Williams was not found for several hours. Finally some one discovered a hand protruding from under the wreck surrounding the engine and after much difficulty poor Williams' mangled body was extricated from among the mass of iron and splinters. Engineer Rhunke escaped without serious injury and is now being cared for at the Walla Walla hospital. Conductor Alvord was not hurt.

Brakeman Carpenter leaves a wife and four small children. His body has been taken to La Grande, where his family reside, for burial. Williams was a new man and is not known here. Carpenter was a regular brakeman on the mount-


