## PERSONAL MENTION.

Mr. B. F. Laughlin went to Portland this afternoon.

Mr. A. S. Bennett left this afternoon for Hood River, where he will speak this evening.

Mr. Howard Isenberg left yesterday for Prineville, near which town he has been engaged to teach school.

Messrs. Fred Wilson and N. J. Sinnott returned today from a very successful campaign tour in Washington.

Messrs. M. T. Nolan and Frank Menefee returned from Kingsley today, and report a very enthusiastic Republican meeting at that place last night.

Sheriff Gray of Crook county took the early morning train for Salem, having in charge John Campbell, who has been sentenced for life for the murder of Ben Swearingen.

Mr. C. A. Gray and wife left this afternoon for their home in Salem. Mr. Gray has just finished the government contracts at Warm Springs agency, and these are now waiting for acceptance by the government.

Judge Geo. Turner of Spokane was in town today and left for Goldendale, where he will make a free silver speech this evening. Mr. Turner was supreme judge of the district that formerly included Goldendale.

## Terrible Accident on the O. R. & N.

At about 10 o'clock Tuesday morning the O. R. & N. freight train No. 21 was wrecked a few miles east of Wallula. With the train running at full speed the engine, No. 136, struck a defective rail on a hillside grade, and a moment later the whole train was in ruins and the lives of two men crushed out. Owing to the accident having taken place several miles distant from a telegraph office it is difficult to obtain positive information. It is reported that the fireman, named Carpenter, and the brakeman, Roy Williams, were killed. Carpenter was found crushed to death between the engine and tender soon after the accident happened, but the body of Williams was not found for several hours. Finally some one discovered a hand protruding from under the wreck surrounding the engine and after much difficulty poor Williams' mangled body was extricated from among the mass of iron and splinters. Engineer Rhunke escaped without serious injury and is now being cared for at the Walla Walla hospital. Conductor Alvord was not hurt.

Brakeman Carpenter leaves a wife and four small children. His body has been taken to La Grande, where his family reside, for burial. Williams was a new man and is not known here. Carpenter was a regular brakeman on the mountain division and was working extra a few days on the Washington division. East Oregonian.

## NOTICE.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: By order of the Common Council of Dalles City, made on the 24 day of October 1896, and entered of record in the records of Dalles City, on the 4 day of October 1896, notice is hereby given that the crosswalks and sidewalks on the following streets or parts of streets have been declared dangerous by said Common Council on said 24 day of October, and the said Common Council will proceed to make the improvements as hereinafter designated, on said streets or parts thereof as declared dangerous after 14 days from the first publication of this notice to-wit: October 8th, 1896, and the cost of such improvement of all crosswalks and of each of them, will be charged and levied upon the corner lots cornering upon the street or street to be intersected by such crosswalks, and upon all lots or parts of lots, to the center of each block cornering upon such intersection, each lot to pay that portion of the entire cost that its street frontage upon the intersecting streets bears to the street frontage of all lots to be assessed upon said streets and the cost of all sidewalks and of each of them respectively will be charged and levied upon the property adjacent thereto and directly benefited thereby, as provided by the charter and ordinances of Dalles City.

- To build a sidewalk on the south side of Fourth street along lots 5 and 6, in block 3, in Trevisa addition to Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk on the east side of Court street, between Second and Third streets, along the south 20 feet of lot 5 in block 5, Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk on Court street between First and Second street along the south 30 feet of lot 1 in block 4, Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk along lot 5 in block 2, on the north side of Alvord street, in Fulton's addition to Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk along lots 2 and 3, in block 2, on the north side of Alvord street in Fulton's addition to Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk along lot 6, in block 21, on Union street in Gates' addition to Dalles City.
- To build a sidewalk along lots 1 and 2, in block 5, on Fourth street in Trevitt's addition to Dalles City.
- To build a crosswalk across Lincoln street on the south side of Second street.
- To build a crosswalk across Second street on the south side of Second street.
- To build a crosswalk across Third street on the east side of Court street.
- To build a crosswalk across Washington on the south side of Fourth street.
- To build a crosswalk across Fulton street on the west side of Federal street.

All of said sidewalks and crosswalks will be built and constructed in the manner provided by the charter and ordinances of Dalles City. Dated this 8th day of October, 1896.

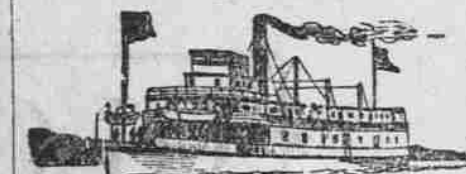
