MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

Florida's barrooms number 216, more than half of them being in three counties. The state's revenue from them is \$108,000.

Louis XIV., spoken of by his contemporaries as a man of majestic stature, was only of medium height. When the royal tombs of St. Denis were violated during the revolution the body of this monarch was dragged out with the rest and discovered to be only five feet six inches.

In celebration of the Mexican national holiday a crown of incandescent lights was placed above the head of the Hidalgo statue in the Hidalgo plaza of Monterey, and there was electric illumination in profusion throughout the square in honor of the Mexican father of his country.

Photography has lately determined the depths to which the sun's rays can penetrate through water, and the result is that at a depth of 553 feet the darkness was about equal to an exposure on a clear but moonless night. The exposed plates at this depth gave no evidence of light action.

AN IDEAL LAUNDRY.

Fixtures Which Are Necessary and Convenient.

The laundry in the great majority of houses is combined with the kitchen. Where it is not necessary to economize space, there is no reason for this arrangement. It is exceedingly desirable to have the room where a weekly washing and ironing can be done apart from the rest of the house. It is beginning to be the fashion to finish off a room in the cellar for this purpose. When the foundation of the house is high enough to allow for windows of proper size, this is an excellent plan. It is always practicable to do so when the house is built on a slope or hillside and the ground is considerably higher in front than it is at the back. Though it adds considerably to the expense of building to make arrangements for a laundry apart from the rest of the house, it is one of those expenditures that pay. It costs little over \$25 or \$30 to attach a special hot water boiler to the laundry.

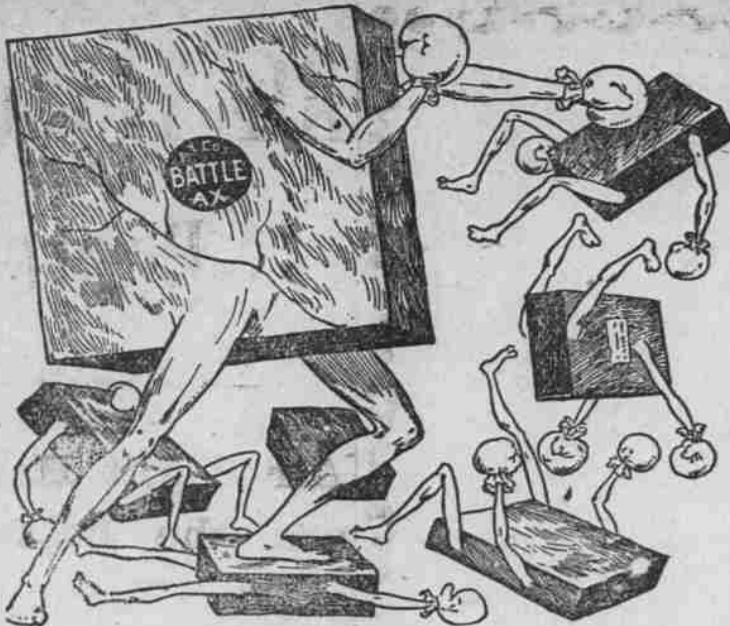

NOTICE.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

By order of the Common Council of Dalles City, made on the 3d day of October 1896, and entered of record in the records of Dalles City, on the 4th day of October 1896, notice is hereby given that the crosswalks and sidewalks on the following streets or parts of streets have been declared dangerous by said Common Council on said 3d day of October, and the said Common Council will proceed to make the improvements as hereinafter designated, on said streets or parts thereof so declared dangerous after 14 days from the first publication of this notice to-wit: October 8th, 1896, and the cost of such improvement of all crosswalks and of each of them, will be charged and levied upon the corner lots cornering upon the street or streets intersected by such crosswalks, and upon all lots or parts thereof, to the center of each block cornering upon such intersection, each lot to pay that portion of the entire cost that its street frontage upon the intersecting streets bears to the street frontage of all lots to be assessed upon said streets, and the cost of all sidewalks and of each of them respectively will be charged and levied upon the property adjacent thereto and directly benefited thereby, as provided by the charter and ordinances of Dalles City.

The crosswalks and sidewalks declared dangerous and about to be improved and built are as follows:

- 1. To build a sidewalk on the south side of Fourth street along lots 3 and 4, in block 3, in Trevitts addition to Dalles City.
2. To build a sidewalk on the east side of Court street, between Second and Third streets, along the south 20 feet of lot 5 in block 5, Dalles City.
3. To build a sidewalk on Court street between First and second street along the south 30 feet of lot 1 in block 4, Dalles City.
4. To build a sidewalk along lot 5 in block 2, on the north side of Alford street, in Fulton's addition to Dalles City.
5. To build a sidewalk along lots 2 and 3, in block 2, on the north side of Alford street in Fulton's addition to Dalles City.
6. To build a sidewalk along lot 6, in block 21, on Union street in Gates' addition to Dalles City.
7. To build a sidewalk along lots 1 and 2, in block 5, on Fourth street in Trevitt's addition to Dalles City.
8. To build a crosswalk on the east side of Court street across Fourth street.
9. To build a crosswalk across Jefferson street on the north side of Second street.
10. To build a crosswalk across Lincoln street on the south side of Second street.
11. To build a crosswalk across Third street on the east side of Court street.
12. To build a crosswalk across Washington street on the south side of Fourth street.
13. To build a crosswalk across Fulton street on the west side of Federal street.
All of said sidewalks and crosswalks will be built and constructed in the manner provided by the charter and ordinances of Dalles City. Dated this 8th day of October, 1896. G. W. PHELPS, Recorder of Dalles City.

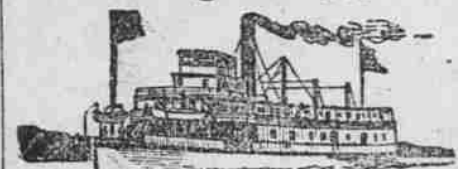
