ANOTHER MORTAL BLOW.

Weyler is back in Havana, and preparing to "deliver a mortal blow" to the insurgents. He seems to be able to practice on the effects of the blow better in the city than in the field, and it works better on paper. Weyler's mortal blows are made, most of them, by telegraph, he being only a good long distance fighter. His recent conflict with Maceo reminds one of Q. Q. Philander Doesticks, and his boxing match with the colored gentleman. Doesticks had practiced boxing with a big stove for an opponent, and after he got expert enough to guard against the stove's "counters," he hired the African gentleman to come in and let him biff him with the gloves. The African, out of respect for his employer, took the pair of gloves the latter had used in boxing with the stove.
