## A BOLD THEFT.

The subsidized members of congress are already at work doing the will of their masters, the bond-aided railroads. No sooner was the Pacific railroad funding bill killed than these tools of those companies began scheming for some other plan to get the best of the government and rob the people of the entire sum owing them. They claim that the government will not get a cent if it forecloses its lien, and pose as friends of the people, while standing in to rob them. They know, just as every sensible man knows, that if the government forecloses its lien, it will get its money. They know that rather than have the government take possession of and operate the Union and Central Pacific roads, that a syndicate would be formed inside of a week to pay the government debt. The other trans continental roads do not want an opposition road managed by the government. It would run them all out of business.

Any scheme to fund the debt is a plan to rob the people. The members of congress know it, and most of the people know it. The time is approaching when the welcoming of a few congressmen home with a coil of hemp, a barrel of tar and a feather bed will become a popular fad.

Those who are responsible for the situation at Salem deserve the severest condemnation. The members of the legislature were elected to do the business of the state, to pass such legislation as was needed, and incidentally to elect a United States senator. Many of them seem to have forgotten already that they are in Salem to carry out the wishes of their constituents, instead of gratifying their own. The election of a senator is a secondary matter. There are plenty of men in the state capable of filling the office, and the plain duty of the legislators is to organize first, and let the majority name the senator. If Mitchell has the majority, well and good. If he has not, then agree on someone else. Our members from this county were not pledged on the senatorial question, nor is it desired that they should be pledged now. They owe it to their constituents, though, to assist in organizing the legislature, and we are pleased to note that all but one of the members from Wasco, and the district are in their seats ready to attend to business.

The situation at Salem shows no material change. The anti-Mitchell elements know that Mitchell has the majority and will be elected if the house organized. They seem to think that anything they may do is justifiable, provided it defeat Mitchell. It is not probable the people will kick against this action. Americans are so accustomed to being led around by their noses and to submitting to the bossing of the politicians, that anything goes. The country used to be run on the principle that the majority ruled; but that is an obsolete doctrine. To the fair-minded citizen it looks as though the majority of the members of the legislature should be permitted to vote for Mitchell if they want to.

The true inwardness of the situation at Salem is that Mitchell now has a majority in joint ballot. The anti-Mitchell crowd refuse to organize. Hoping by delay to weaken Mitchell's forces. That's all there is in it, and that is why our great contemporary is so happily quiet.

If the sheepmen of Eastern Oregon expect to do anything towards opening the Cascade reservation, it be-

hooves them to get their memorials passed by the legislature, and also to have two senators from this state. One of their own men is standing in the way of the organization of the house, and if he continues to do so, they can blame only one of themselves.

Secretary Herbert says the government is paying \$382 a ton more for armor plate than it costs to make it. One would think Carnegie would be satisfied with that kind of profit, but at the same time the report comes that wages are being reduced by that gentleman.

There is an impression in Salem that the fight in the house is to be to a finish, and that no organization will be made prior to February 9th, so as to kill all chance of electing a senator.

Jonathan Bourne is said to have a sack long enough to pay all the expenses of the legislature. Of course it is all rumor, but the wad is said to amount to \$60,000.

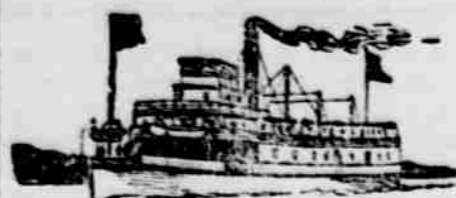
