Over Three Thousand Cases of Plague Are Reported.

BOMBAY, Jan. 18.—The situation is growing rapidly worse, and the exodus from the city on account of the bubonic plague continues. Official returns issued today show 3633 cases of plague reported and 2592 deaths from the pestilence.

The Times of India complains that the sanitary conditions of Bombay have been allowed to deteriorate for ten years. It adds that the whole future trade of the city is involved and no expense upon the part of the government to stamp out the plague can be too costly.

Cinnamon as an Antiseptic.

That "no living germ of disease can resist the antiseptic power of essence of cinnamon for more than a few hours" is the conclusion announced by Mr. Chamberland as the result of prolonged research and experiment. It is said to destroy microbes as effectively, if not as rapidly, as corrosive sublimate. Even the scent of it is fatal to microbes, and Mr. Chamberland says a decoction of cinnamon should be taken freely by persons living in places affected by typhoid or cholera.—Medical Age.
