Annexation of Hawaii Essential to American Commerce.

Leadership in the commerce of the Pacific ocean is the natural heritage of the United States, because the foremost in ability among the many civilized nations inhabiting its coasts.

The elements which are to contribute to this commerce are such as to render certain an enormous development at no distant period. On one side of the ocean are the 350,000,000 of China and 40,000,000 of Japan.

Notice the number of steamship arrivals has near doubled in three years, and is now three a week.

It is nearly certain, however, that a new and highly stimulating element is soon to enter the steam traffic of the Pacific, especially that part which most call at Honolulu.

Teachers' Examination.

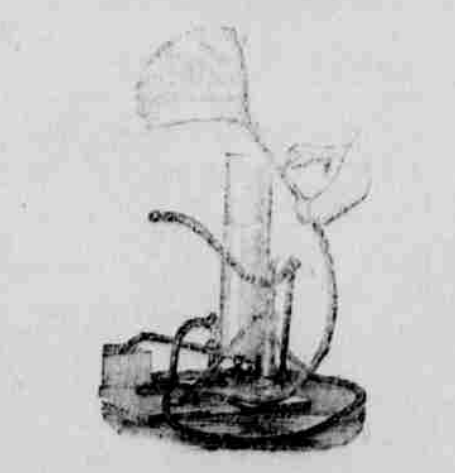
