#### BALDNESS A DISEASE.

A French Doctor Says It May Be Prevented.

Contagion Scattered by Barbers Whose Implements the Microbes Find Lodgment

Now the real cause of baldness has been discovered, and a French dermatologist, Dr. Labourand, suggests a remedy. By the use of this remedy, he says, baldness can be prevented, and in the next generation it may be unknown.

Can the awful consequence of such a discovery be imagined? Can people of this generation contemplate such a social condition as a total lack of baldness? What will the ballet girl do without that inspiring row of shining pates just beyond the footlight? What will the funny man do, deprived of his fund of baldheaded jokes? Hair will grow in vulgar abundance.

It has been known for some time among medical men that baldness is a disease. It has even been supposed to be due to a specific microbe. In fact, such an extraordinary amount of evidence in favor of the theory has been accumulated that the idea is now generally accepted. They are placed for fattening in shallow water near the foreshore, and so close to sewer outfalls as to be pretty constantly bathed by sewage. The worst places in this respect are Southend, Grimsby, Shoreham and the Isle of Wight. On the other hand.
