The Probable Fate of a Young Indiana Farmer.

WICHITA, Kan., March 2.—L. J. White was murdered by Art Ingram, a local gambler and thug, last night in front of the latter's home on North Water street, in a disreputable part of town.

Ingram did not know the result of his aim, or was too much under the influence of liquor to realize it, for he went to the police station, told the officers he had got into trouble, and asked them to attend to the injured man.

Ingram's wife was abducted by a gang of young toughs over a year ago, taken to Griswold Park, drugged and assaulted. Ingram was one of the gang, and was forced to marry her.

White has until recently conducted a restaurant on East Douglas avenue. He was 55 years old, a member of the Modern Woodmen and the Knights of Pythias. Ingram is a molder by trade. He is an opium fiend.
