Express Car Looted.

LOUISVILLE, March 10.—A special from Birmingham, Ala., says a north-bound express train on the Louisville & Nashville road, due at Louisville at noon Wednesday, was held up by six masked men near Calera, Tuesday morning.

At the water tank in the woods two men boarded the engine, and covered the engineer and fireman with pistols, forced them to uncouple the locomotive and express car from the remainder of the train and run forward for about a mile. Here four more men were in waiting.

The messenger refused to open the express car. The door was broken open, the messenger covered with pistols and forced to open the safe. A number of packages of money were secured. The total amount is not known, but is said to have been large.

CARNITA TONIGHT.

The Most Beautiful Costuming, and Most Magical Effects.

Those who admire the beautiful should not fail to attend the Carnita Company's entertainment tonight.

The Portland Wheat Trade.

The local wheat trade is a trifle firmer, but the improvement was not so much due to legitimate present trade wants as to a speculative movement, based upon crop reports on the continent of Europe. Wheat cargoes are freely arriving off the English coast. The situation as at present indicated, lies with weather conditions from now on to the new harvest. As stated four weeks ago, the shipping season for wheat this season is finished, and nothing more will be done until new wheat arrives. Wheat remaining on hand in the interior will be used for milling purposes, and probably this may not last until the arrival of the new crop. Some of the mills are reported buying Walla Walla at 80c per bushel. Quotations are nominal here, Walla Walla \$0.82c; Valley firmly held, and bids are for \$1.083c per bushel.
