ORDINANCE NO. 162.

The following is a part of ordinance No. 162, to provide for the taxing and

killing of dogs: The owners or persons having in charge any dog permitted to run at large within the city limits, shall, on or before the 12th day of May of each year, pay into the city treasury the sum of \$1.50 for each and every male dog, and the sum of \$3 for each and every slut or female dog, which shall entitle him to a receipt from the treasurer, which receipt shall be numbered and shall des- Pullman ignate the sex of the dog and the owner's name and the amount paid; and upon the presentation of each receipt to the recorder, he shall issue a license to the holder thereof, which shall designate the owner's name and the number of the license, which number shall correspond with that worn by the dog or slut.

The marshal will seize, kill and properly bury in some suitable place outside the city limits any and all dogs found running at large, in violation of the above provisions; also any and all dogs wearing collars running at large on which the owner or keeper has failed to pay or renew the license.

Any person or inhabitant of this city permitting any dog of which he is the owner or over which he has the control, to go abroad in any of the streets, squares lanes or public places of this city without having first paid the license required by this ordinance, and having the number thereof stamped or engraved on the collar upon such dog, shall upon conviction thereof before the recorder, be subject to a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50, or imprisonment for not more than fifteen days.

Sale of School District Bonds.

School District No. 29, in Wasco county, Oregon, at a meeting regularly called therefor, having voted to bond said district in the sum of \$3,000, to be in six bonds of \$500 each, payable absolutely in twenty years and redeemable at the pleasure of said district after ten years, with interest coupons attached, interest payable semi-annually.
