**Edhim Pasha's Orders.**

ELASSONA, April 10.—Edhim Pasha, commander-in-chief of the Turkish army, has received orders from Constantinople to cross the frontier of Greece with his forces, should it be proved that the Greek regular troops are among the invaders. The Turkish troops will continue advancing against the invaders, who will shortly find themselves between three fires.

The telegraph line between here and Janina, the headquarters of the Turkish army, stationed to meet the possible advance of the Greeks from Arta, has been cut, but the service continues via Monsatari. The Greek irregulars crossed the frontier in the night and surprised and burned four Turkish outpost stations. The Turkish troops are advancing toward the point of attack from Diskata, Isippilo and Metzou.

**Montenegrin Frontier.**

LONDON, April 10.—A dispatch from Constantinople reports serious trouble near the Montenegrin frontier, in the district of Sera. Sanguinary conflicts have taken place between Albanians and Mussulmans and Christians. Troops sent to restore order lost several men killed. The Montenegrin minister at Constantinople has sent a protest warning the Turkish government that if Mussulmans continue their attacks, it will be difficult for Montenegro to prevent her subjects from going to the assistance of the Christians.
