



Opal Found in Grant County. While prospecting upon the mouniain back of Canyon City, Grant county, searching for pocket ledges, Clyde Lockwood and Ed. Chambers panned out a fine looking specimen of opal, which glows with great brilliancy when held up toward the light, and which would make a magnificent ornament if properry cut and polished.
