The Chone Tree.

Chone is the name given by the Kanakas to a tree which flourishes in New Caledonia. It reaches a height of 40 feet, and puts forth beautiful white flowers, having a perfume like that of jasmine. The chone is the Cerbera manghas of the botanist, and belongs Mays. to the family of the Apocynaceae. It yields a milky juice, like the Indiarubber tree, which, when evaporated, leaves a black gum, that softens in boiling water like gutta-percha. It is impermeable, like gutta-percha, but has the advantage of dissolving in petroleum. The solution painted or floated on wood and evaporated leaves a thin layer of the gum, impervious to water. Leather impregnated with the gum can remain in water for hours without becoming moist. Moreover, according to Dr. Prat Flottes, a French naval surgeon, it makes an excellent waterproof varnish for boots when it is dissolved in essence of turpentine.—N. Y.
