A Bushel of Brandled Chocolates Won't Make a Pony Glassful. "Why, a man might eat an entire bushel of ordinary brandied chocolate without getting a pony glassful of the pure spirit. Confectioners have a mixture of their own for this purpose, which I can assure you
