ELECTRIC LIGHTING.

There Is Said to Be \$500,000,000 In-

vested in This Country. In the electric lighting field the total capital invested in the United States is given as over \$500,000,000. The number of plants, public and private, is over 10,000, says an exchange. The number of motors in use is estimated at about 500,000, and their value at about \$100,000,000. The electrical apparatus used in mining is estimated at \$100,000,-000, and the value of the electric ele-vator industry will probably not fall short of \$15,000,000.

The most important of all the electric industries, however, is that of electric railways. In this field the investment is very great, and in the United States is represented by a capitalization of over \$700,000,000. The number of trolley cars in use is now over 25,000 and these run over 12,000 miles of track The electric railways represent more than 90 per cent, of all the street and suburban railroads of the country.

The aggregate of all the capital invested in electric lighting, electric railways and electric power is about \$1, 500,000,000,000, and this does not include the value of establishments that man ufacture the machinery and apparatus. As many of these are among the largest industrial enterprises in the world, and as nearly all are concerns of consider able magnitude, it is evident that their combined capital will run up into large figures.-Detroit Free Press.


