wheat, the statistics of the New York World give some satisfactory reasons. In the first place the "visible supply" has run down from 164,319,000 bushels in 1894 to 67,000,000 bushels in August, 1897. This alone makes a shortage of 100,000,000 bushels, enough to cause a sharp rise, but on top of this comes a shortage in the European crop amounting to 222,000,000 bushels, or a grand total shortage of more than 300,000,-000. On top of this still, the corn crop shows a shortage of 250,000,000 bushels, and a corresponding advance in price caused by the deficiency. The World estimates that increased prices will mean this year more than \$500,000,000 to the farmers.
