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

COL. DONAN WRITES IT. A Pamphlet on Oregon and Washington to Be Issued by the O. E. & N.

Col. Pat Donan was here yesterday, gathering statistics for a book which he will get out for the O. R. & N., showing the resources of the country. Col. Donan prepared the copy for a similar work for the Rio Grande road, the first edition of which cost the company \$40,000 dollars.

Donan has a style all his own, and to say that it is "catchy," does not do it justice, for while the quaintness of his arguments is always visible, it must not be lost sight of that there is always substantial facts behind them. One of the most startling calculations ever made; was that of Donan's concerning the unlimited wealth of Salt Lake. He proved by the analysis of the water and the accepted area and depth of the lake, that the minerals contained in solution which he carried on his back a distance O. R. & N. deserves a great deal of credit for securing the services of Col. Donans' facile pen to make known in his own inimitable way the facts concerning this section of the great West.
