The Miners Have Accepted a Compromise

RECENTLY MADE BY OFFICERS

They Will Return to Work Soon-Twenty-one Corpses at Bazelton, Pennsylvania.

COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 11 .- The miners' strike, which was declared on July 4th, was brought to an end this evening so far at least, as Western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and West Virginia are concerned, by the action of the convention of miners, who have been in session since Wednesday. After a day of voting and wrangling, the convention voted to accept the proposition of the Pittsburg operators. The vote was 495 for, and 317 against, accepting the terms of settlement, and eleven votes were not cast. The delegation from Illinois, which had 250 votes, was unanimously against the settlement, and Indiana and West Virginia voted solidly to accept the proposition, but there were scattering votes among the Ohio and Pennsylvania men, against it. The resolution is as follows:

"Resolved, That we, the miners of South Coast, at less than \$100,000. Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio, Incontinued to the bitter end.
