In the circuit court in Umatilla county suit has been brought in a case that the whole world can hardly parallel.

Last year a farmer named Edwin Rush rented a farm from a capitalist named William Wagner, and some time ago Rush, liking the place, made Wagner an offer of \$9000 for it, which was accepted, the former paying the latter \$50 cash down to bind the trade. Since then, thanks to Providence having smiled on the western and frowned on the eastern hemisphere, making bountiful crops here and meager ones there and a good price for all, Rush has raised in one season enough wheat on the place to more than pay for it, and one day last week he called upon Mr. Wagner, and, in presence of witnesses, tendered him the balance of the purchase price, \$8,950, all in shining gold twenties, except one \$10 piece. Wagner refused to accept the money, having come to the conclusion that he had sold too cheap, and hence the law suit.
