WOMEN IN GERMANY.

Recent Laws Tend Towards the Curtailment of Her Privileges.

Germany is the only country in the world which is taking backward steps in regard to the rights and privileges of street. women. The old law, which made the wife the seri of the husband and obliterated her individuality in all legal maiters, has not only been recently reaffirmed, but her rights, privileges and immunities have been squeezed into an even smaller compass than before.

For several years a commission, composed of the ablest jurists in Germanymembers of the judiciary, the faculties of the universities and prominent lights of the bar-has been engaged in the unification and codification of the laws of thirty-one kingdoms, duchies and principalities that make up the German empire, to secure uniformity and a common code of practice everywhere throughout the empire. The new code is completed and goes into effect two years hence.

When the action of the commission regarding the laws that concern women was made known a petition signed by 60,000 mothers and wives of the best citizens of Germany was presented to the reichstag protesting against the discrimination against them, and demanding the same rights, privileges and liberties and the same justice that is accorded to the women of England and France. They asserted that it was an insult to the German race for the government to assume that its women were inferior to those of other nations, and compared the new laws of Germany with those of other civilized countries to show the extent of the injustice imposed upon them.

No attention was paid to the petition, except indirect condemnation; so a congress was gathered, composed of hundreds of the best women of the empire, I' who made a second appeal for greater consideration in property rights and corporation organized under the laws of the state of Oregon, Plaintiff,

father, her husband or her son, and the law requires her to obey their orders. When a woman marries all her property passes into the ownership of her husband forever. He has the legal right to use or dispose of it in any manner he chooses regardless of her wishes or protests. If they are divorced the property remains with him. When she assents to the marriage vow she forfeits independence and confers upon him absolute jurisdiction over her mind, body and estate. He can compel her to work or do anything else that is lawful for women to do, and she has no relief or protection except in public opinion. Some of the American heiresses who have married German barons have learned of this law to their sorrow.

The empress takes no apparent interest in the movement for the advancement of women. She leaves that for her mother-in-law, the ex-Empress Frederick, probably because her imperial husband is so positive in his views upon such questions. The empress to the Japanese notion,
