THE AMERICAN MACHINIST. His Work Esteemed the World Over

Wherever Machines Are Used. The fame of the American machinist extends everywhere; his ingenuity in planning and his skill in execution are known wherever man uses machines and tools. If there is any one branch of work in which he excels more than in another it is in the building of special machinery, by which is meant machines not kept in stock or regularly manufactured, but specially devised and made for special uses, says an exchange.

For instance, man designs some article of use which he works up by hand, or by the aid of machinery. To pro-duce this article in quantities, at such a cost that it can be sold at a profit, special machinery is required. The designer or inventor takes the article to the builder of machines and says: "Can you make a machine that will make these things, and will you guar-antee it to work?" It is altogether probable that the machine builder answers yes to both questions, because there is practically nothing that he can-

not do. Special machinery is built for a wide variety of uses. As the knowledge of American skill in this direction, now long familiar, has spread, orders have come from all over the world and special machinery is sent from here also for use in enterprises installed or conducted by Americans in foreign countries.




