The hop situation in the Silverton district remains unchanged. There are practically no buyers in the field. The market seems to be in a peculiar condition. The growers show a disposition to hold, and the buyers are also holding back. The baling is now all finished, and quite a lot of hops are stored at the different warehouses. So far, we have not heard of a single hop sale in the vicinity. Scarcely any offers have been made either by buyers or growers. From the best information from the hop markets of the world, brewers seem to be well stocked for six months at least, and it is likely that it will be some time before a general market opens. The backward market keeps a large amount of money out of circulation.

Accident at Eugene.

Another serious if not fatal accident has befallen a Eugene man.

While painting on the roof of the dormitory at the University of Oregon Henry McCrady fell to the ground, a distance of nearly forty-five feet.

The accident happened so quickly that other workmen employed with him on the roof are hardly able to give a lucid account of the affair.

A mattress was placed on a wagon and he was removed to his home, in the western part of the city. At this time it is impossible to tell the extent of his injuries as an examination cannot be made until a reaction sets in, and it will probably be morning before the physicians can do anything besides temporarily relieving his suffering. It is apparent, however, that he is injured internally, and it appears also that his shoulder is broken.

This afternoon the injured man is only partially conscious, and the blood flowing from the inside shows that his internal injuries are quite serious.
