Rice Meringue Pudding. Four tablespoonfuls rice, wash, add one quart of milk; let it stand to soak half an hour, then put on to boil. When it begins to boil, set back on the range and simmer two hours or until well cooked. Then drop in one at a time and stir well the yelks of four eggs, the grated rind and half the juice of one lemon, piece of butter about the size of a walnut, a little nutmeg or any preferred spice; sweeten to taste and add a pinch of salt. Put in the pudding dish, beat the whites of the eggs to a stiff froth, add two teaspoonfuls of powdered sugar, spread over the pudding and brown. Serve either cold or \$125 hot.-Ladies' World.
