THE WHEAT MARKET.

WALLA WALLA—Wheat weakened Thursday 1c per bushel; club 64c; blue stem 67c.

LIVERPOOL—Wheat quiet Thursday; No. 1, standard California, 37s 3d; cargoes on passage, easy for white, quiet for red; English country markets, firm; French country markets, steady.

SAN FRANCISCO—There have been no changes in the flour market for a long time. The market is quiet, and mills are running lightly. Wheat is easier, though not generally lower for spot.

CHICAGO—The opening in wheat Thursday was exceptionally slow. Liverpool opened 3/8d lower, but had recovered 1/4d of this at the start here, which was rather an encouragement to buyers, and was apparently the only cause for a slight opening advance. There was some realizing right after the opening, which resulted in the first decline, but after that the market seemed to be left to drift. Bradstreet's reported an increase of 1,053,600 bushels in the world's visible wheat and flour, all of it east of the Rockies in this country, the stocks in and afloat for Europe being unchanged.

PORTLAND—The local wheat market has succeeded in holding on to all of the late advance, and for several days has hung around 75c a bushel, as an export value, with some competition among millers in the interior occasionally boosting this price up by varying stages to as high as 77c. There is a decided objection to paying the milling quotations by most of the exporters, and the leading operators of this city have had an extreme limit of 75 1/2c out for the past three days. An occasional lot has been taken in for higher figures than this by an exporter who happened to have some cheap tonnage, which would enable him to get out even, but at present charter rates and prices for wheat afloat at Liverpool there is no money in the business at over 75 1/2c for Walla Walla.

GOOD WORDS FOR WASHINGTON

Improvement in Moral Tone of the Nation's Capital.

Gen. H. V. Boynton, the veteran Washington correspondent, has been for more than 30 years collecting news and writing letters. Few men know so thoroughly as he the inside history of the capitol, the white house, and the departments. Being asked what he considered the most important deduction from his experience at Washington, he answered:

"The marvelous improvement in the moral atmosphere, and the general tone and honesty of the government. We, the people of the United States, have the most honest government in the world. It is and has been for many years more honest than ever before, and is to-day more honestly and efficiently administered than any private business that I have ever examined. I mean that there is less waste and less defalcation.

"Look at the great postal service, for instance. Where in the world will you find any private agency which does so much and does it so well, and at so little cost? And change of parties makes no difference. Thorough honesty is the rule.

"The atmosphere of the white house is pure beyond that of any royal residence, and this is the most moral and peaceable city in the United States, if not in the world. It makes me laugh when those good people come from New York and Cincinnati and away out west to help reform Washington."

PERSECUTED IN AMERICA.

John Wesley Suffered for Refusing Communion to a Woman.

Rev. W. J. Scott, D. D., writes of "Wesley's Persecution in America," in Ladies' Home Journal, and from the famous preacher's journal tells the story of his persecution in Georgia, which ultimately resulted in his quitting America and returning to England in 1737. "During the afternoon before Wesley's departure he was approached by the recorder of Savannah, who informed him that he must not leave the province until he had given bond in 450 sterling, and in addition furnished bail to answer Mr. Widdiamson's charge. Wesley responded: 'I have given him every opportunity to make good his accusation, but he refused to do so; and now, sir,' he continued, with emphasis and firmness, 'I must insist that, as an official, you have treated me and the trustees of the colony very ill. I shall neither give bond nor bail. You know your business and I know mine.'

"The same afternoon," he adds, 'I shook the dust off my feet and left Savannah, after preaching there one year and nine months, not as I ought, but as I was able.'

"The show made by his enemies of a purpose to intercept him was a shallow pretext, and is now so regarded."

Wesley's persecution was the outcome of his refusal to admit a woman of his congregation to holy communion without evidence of her repentance and contrition.

Cooked by Cold.

Anyone who has ever picked up with a bare hand a piece of intensely cold iron knows that the touch burns almost as badly as if the metal were red-hot. Indeed, the action of great heat and extreme cold are so similar that a Hungarian chemist has turned the latter to account to prepare meats for food. He subjects the meat to 60 degrees of frost, and then seals it up in air-tight tin cans. The result is that the meat, which is practically "cooked by cold," will keep any time, and can be eaten with very little further preparation.—Cincinnati Enquirer.
