LI HUNG AND CHINA.

The Great Man's Relations with the Common People.

He Has a Very Difficult Position to Maintain and is Too Progressive for the Slow-Going Celestials.

That was a strange collocation of a single day's dispatches which told how Li Hung Chang, upon his arrival at Peking, had been made minister of foreign affairs and had been reprimanded for omitting one or more of the proper forms in paying respects to the dowager empress.

It is quite hopeless for an occidental to attempt to penetrate the mysteries of Chinese politics. The more the kingdom is laid open by conquering invaders the less do we understand what is disclosed.

There is reason to doubt, however, that Li Hung Chang has been made minister of foreign affairs. In the first place there is no such minister and, indeed, no such ministry; and in China that is rather more than a detail.

Li Hung Chang is an energetic person, but he is quite helpless against this inert resistance. We may be quite sure that a Chinaman who believes that the isolation of China ought to be modified is looked upon either as a harmless visionary or dangerous radical.

THE STAMP COLLECTORS.

Some enterprising gentlemen in Santos have proposed to take the post office and run it as a business, by working off unlimited quantities of postage stamps upon the dealers and collectors of the rest of the world.

The Peruvian government has realized a net profit of \$19,550 from the sale of the last commemorative issue. As long as collectors keep on purchasing these commemorative issues the South American governments will find events to "commemorate."

Perhaps the greatest rarity turning up the past year was a pair of two-cent circular stamps of British Guiana, issued in 1850, and they are probably worth upward of \$5,000.

Of the \$1,000 breweries estimated to be in the world, 26,000 are in Germany. The total value of gold in the world at the present time is about \$3,000,000,000.

One hundred and twenty firemen are required to feed the furnaces of a first-class Atlantic steamer.

A nail-making machine produces as many nails in a given time as were formerly made by 1,000 men.

The number of public houses in London is 2,104, in addition to 2,243 beer houses, 218 hotels, 120 clubs and 219 restaurants, making a total of 7,904 licensed houses.

Official estimates of the world's raw sugar product for this year are as follows: Beet, 4,960,000 tons; cane, 2,655,000 tons. Stock on hand, 1,150,000 tons, total, 8,765,000 tons.

It takes each year 200,000 acres of forest to supply cross ties for the railroads of the United States. It takes 15,000,000 ties to supply the demand, for which the contractors get on an average 35 cents apiece, making in the aggregate \$5,250,000.

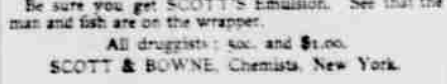
