HARD ON CATS.

A French Government Commissioner Censures the Codders of Official Cats.

The French government has just had occasion to appoint a commission to inquire into the grievances of the cats in its employ. Their report on the manner of their official stipends, and will rouse a righteous indignation in the bosom of all friends of the feline monarch.

It appears that cats are kept in some of the French military magazines to keep down the surplus population of rats and mice. Their food is regulated by ministerial decree according to circumstances, and at present there is a regulation in force authorizing an expenditure of 20 centimes per cat per day. But this does not seem enough, as the unfortunate governmental cats have grown extremely thin, so that the military appointed specialists to inquire into the matter. These have greatly reported that "the cats of the army are very slow to accustom themselves to the diet prescribed by the government circular. Thus they seldom eat bread, and never lap up gruel water unless actually driven thereto by pangs of hunger, so that they are dying off or else abandoning the military magazines."

A Chinese Pile-driver.

Piles were being driven in one of the new buildings for a foundation for a punch. They were eight inches in diameter and fourteen feet long. The staking was bamboo, and so was the frame for the hammer, which was a round piece of cast iron with a hole in the center for a guide rod. Attached to the hammer block were J ropes, carried up to the top of the frame and down on the outside, looking very much like the old-fashioned Marjolin. Twenty-seven women had hold of the ends, and with a wop-song, all together, pulled down on the rod, four feet, traveled the hammer; then, at a scream, all let go, and down it came on top of the pile, which was protected by a band of ring. The women were paid 20 cents in gold per day. This Marjolin driver is in general use throughout Japan and China.

REVERSING NATURE'S PROCESS.

Some Things That Would Happen If Experimentalists Had Their Way.

The reversibility of the physical processes of nature has lately been the subject of interesting comment, says Cassier's Magazine. Lord Kelvin, for example, has been credited with saying that all of them, no matter how complex they might appear to the human senses, consist in reality of the motions of invisible molecules, and if, therefore, by some means, all these molecules could, at the same time, be made to move in exactly the opposite direction, and each with the same velocity that it possessed at the moment, all the world would begin and continue to move backward; waterfalls would flow up the sides of cliffs; rivers would run upward from the sea; rain would rise; full-blown flowers would shrink into buds and plants would wither into seedlings; man himself would become young again, passing from old age to infancy. Just what kind of pictures such a topsyturvy world would present may be seen with a kinetoscope running backward. Prof. Quenouin, according to report, has made observations in this line, and some time ago communicated them to the French academy of science.

James Dilla, who died near Paintsville, Ky., recently, was credited with being only nine days short of 100 years old.

Mr. and Mrs. Stephen G. Thurber, of Warren, R. I., aged respectively 86 and 80 years, died within three days of each other, and were buried together in the same grave.
