HINTS ON FRUIT CANNING. Few Things That the Housewife Should Remember.

In canning fruit, remember that it is hard and disagrecable work at best, and unless you can come within sight of its highest possibilities, "the game is not worth the candle," Whether it is good, bad or indifferent depends upon your own knowledge and skill. smaller the better. Blackberries, no matter how fine or of what kind, are never satisfactory and palatable. Cherry pits add much to the flavor, and when removed from the fruit a handful should be tied in a niece of net and put in the center of each jar. Pear seeds should be used in the same way richer and handsomer colored if the sirup is made of half current julce.

If plums and peaches are immersed in boiling water to loosen the skins, only a few should be treated at once, and those should first be put in a wire basket or sieve. After remaining two minutes or so dip in cold water and gently rub off the skins.


