The trial of Emil Zola, who is being prosecuted by the government as a result of a letter which he wrote last December to the Aurora, strongly reflecting on high officials connected with the Dreyfus case, opened in Paris yesterday. Zola in Despair.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—David Christie Murray, novelist and playwright, had a column interview yesterday with Emil Zola, which he published today in the Daily News. Zola, it appears, was anything but hopeful of the outcome of his trial, and said:

"We know everything about the Dreyfus case, but it is impossible to describe the pressure to impose silence upon men who are able and ready to reveal the truth. Our documentary evidence is not even looked at, and our witnesses have refused to testify or been ordered to be silent. The facts are clear and absolutely beyond denial, but the authorities refuse to allow us to produce our evidence and then hold up the feebleness of our case to the derision of the public."
