But enough of this. The Oregonian's latest attack on Mr. Mitchell simply shows to what extremities that paper is driven for ammunition in its jealous warfare against this gentleman.

Mr. F. A. Seufert has achieved fame through his refusal to join with the fusionists. The action of the Democrats in cleaving unto the Populists will turn many men away from their party, as it seems to have done with Mr. Seufert. The fight is squarely on between free silver and sound money, and it is not difficult for each voter to determine where he belongs.

The gradual increase of the receipts from the Dingley tariff seems to justify its friends in their predictions that it will soon produce sufficient revenue for the uses of the government. The customs returns for January were \$14,300,000 in round figures. This indicates an increase over the December returns of \$2,-600,000, and is exactly \$3,000,000 more than the receipts of January, 1897. Beginning with August, the first full month of the Dingley tariff, there has been an increase every month. This increase amounted to

\$900,000 in September, to \$1,800,000 in October, to \$100,000 in November and \$1,900,000 in December. The receipts for the early days of February indicated a decidedly upward tendency, so that a considerable surplus is expected at the end of the present month.




