

A private telegram received at Seattle from Nanaimo, B. C., says that the steamer Queen has arrived there from Skagway, bringing confirmatory news of the loss of the steamer Clara Nevada.

The Populist and Democratic conference committees' session at Pendleton Wednesday agreed upon a basis of union in the county campaign, and will submit recommendations to the county conventions.

The funeral of Edith Schmidt, who died yesterday afternoon, will take place from the residence of her parents, on Third street, Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. All friends of the family are invited to attend.

The scow Interstate was taken to Fisher's Landing today in tow of the Regulator, and will be used to transport rock to the government jetty at Gray's Harbor. This scow was purchased from J. T. Peters of this place.

It has been ascertained that the man who died at Medford Tuesday from internal injuries received near Central Point a few days previous, was Peter Nelson of South Bend, Wash. It is certain now that he was murdered.

Our football team is practicing every evening and are in splendid trim to put up a hard game. At any rate they will be able to make it very interesting for the Willamettes, and a cordial invitation is extended to all to be present and cheer our boys on to victory.

Died, this morning at the home of Wm. H. Taylor in Dry Hollow, near this place, Archie, the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Long, aged about 10 months. The remains will be taken to Brownsville and interred in the family burying ground of Mrs. Long's relatives, near that place.

The jurors were dismissed yesterday afternoon as all court business in which

they were required had been transacted, and this morning the remaining business was finished and one of the shortest terms of circuit court on record in Wasco county, came to a close.

The divorce case of Inez F. Broadbent vs. F. M. Broadbent was tried in open court yesterday afternoon and the decree granted, and by that decree two more hearts were made glad, or at least that is what one would be forced to surmise from the pleased look which the plaintiff bore as she left on the Regulator for her home this morning.

The river continues to rise, and this morning stands just eighteen inches above yesterday morning's mark. At 7 o'clock it stood at sixteen feet above low water. It is the supposition that strong chinook winds are blowing in the Blue Mountains and toward the headwaters, which causes the unusually early rise. If this continues there will be no danger whatever of high water during the summer months.

The tickets for the Old Folks' concert, to take place February 23d, will be placed on sale, beginning this evening, at the Snipes-Kinersley drugstore. The price of admission will be 50 cents for adults, with no extra charge for reserved seats. Admission for children, 25 cents; but when they occupy reserved seats they will be charged the full rate. The concert promises to be a splendid event, and all who attend can be assured a fine entertainment.

A special bulletin to THE CHRONICLE, which was received this morning, states that a thorough investigation into the Maine disaster is proceeding as fast as possible. Many rumors are afloat, however, that are not at all to be relied upon, and conclusions should not be drawn too rapidly. As soon as possible the wreck will be raised and the dead buried. Many men of prominence seem to be of the opinion that nothing short of treachery could have caused the accident.

Owing to the fact that the public sleeping places in this city will be inadequate to accommodate all the guests who will be in attendance at the Wool-growers Association which will be held in this city March 1st, 2d and 3d, anyone who has sleeping accommodations for one or more, will confer a favor upon the committee by reporting to Simon Bolton, chairman. At least one hundred guests will be forced to seek sleeping quarters outside of the hotels, and we hope the people of The Dalles will not be slow about offering the necessary accommodations. GRAND JURY REPORT.

The Jury Finishes Its Labor and Asks to Be Discharged.

In the circuit court of the state of Oregon, for Wasco county, for the February term, 1898.

In the matter of the final report of the grand jury, we, the grand jurors, submit the following, as and for our final report:

We have returned into court six true bills and four not true bills of indictment in the four days we have been in session.

We have also examined the clerk's, sheriff's, assessor's and treasurer's offices, and we find the said offices, with the books, records and papers therein well and correctly kept, so far as we are able to judge in the limited opportunity allowed us for such examination.

We have also examined the county jail, and while we believe the same is in as good condition as it can be kept under the present conditions, it is not properly ventilated and not capable of proper ventilation. We recommend that a modern jail be built by the county, separate from the court house.

We have not visited the county farm, but have had a full and complete statement of the county poor at said farm, from Hon. Robt. Mays, county judge, and are satisfied that the county poor are well and properly cared for.

Wherefore, having finished our labors, we respectfully ask the court to accept this, our final report, and that we may be discharged.

VICTORY FOR THE D. C. & A. C.

The Oregon Road Club Team Defeated Last Night.

The Oregon Road Club's team arrived on the 5:20 train last night; but owing to circumstances, one of their players could not come, so that there were but five contestants. The players in their team were Richard H. Pickering, Thos. Melburn, Captain H. B. Graham, F. W. Baile and J. Oliver.

Four games were played, and from the way the first one resulted, our players began to think that victory was beyond their grasp. In this our men scored but 138, while the Road Club team made 159. In the second our boys made 249 pins, while the opposition team made but 184. In the third game the Road Club was beaten by 24 pins, while in the last game our boys won by eight.

As can be seen by the above totals, our boys won the victory by 74 pins. The average for the four games for the Dalles players was 40-1-5, while the Portland boys average was 36-1/2. Three of our players scored a higher average than Portland's highest man, they being Tolmie 44-1/2, Bradshaw 43-1/2, and Houghton 41. Baile had the highest average of the Portland players, which was 38-1/4.

A return game will be played on the Road Club alleys next Thursday, the 24th, and as the Road Club team will have the advantage of rolling on their own alleys, they will undoubtedly give our boys a tight game.

NEWS NOTES.

A filibustering expedition destined for Cuba has been intercepted by the authorities at Kingston, Jamaica, and a quantity of arms and ammunition seized.

The first corn convention ever held in the United States began yesterday at the Great Northern hotel at Chicago. About 150 delegates are present, and more are expected.

A discussion upon coast defenses was the interesting feature of the senate yesterday. Many senators took the ground that the appropriations should be for the full amount of the estimates by the war department, instead of some millions less.

Information has been received at San Francisco by Collector Jackson that a Canadian sailing vessel was seen Tuesday off Drake's bay, and that she was violating the sealing regulations by being in American waters. The cutter Rush was sent in pursuit of the alleged poacher.

The Campagne Generale Trans-Atlantic line steamer Flachet, bound from Marseilles for Colon, was totally wrecked on Anaga point, Canary Island, at 1 o'clock Wednesday morning. Her captain, second officer, eleven of her crew

and one passenger were saved. Thirty-eight of the crew and forty-nine passengers were lost.
