### Spray No. 1.

Winter Spray for San Jose Scale and Curl Leaf of the Peach.

INGREDIENTS.  
Lime, unstacked ..... 30 pounds  
Sulphur, powdered ..... 20 pounds  
Salt, Liverpool ..... 15 pounds

The above is a very efficient remedy for the San Jose Scale and Curl Leaf of the Peach, and is an excellent fertilizer for the trees. It not only destroys the scale and prevents the spread of the curl leaf, but removes all lichens and keeps the bark soft.

In the case of curl leaf, the greatest good will result from the early spraying, as it prevents to a large degree the dormant spores of this parasitic fungus coming to life, and destroys any that may have started.

### DIRECTIONS.

To be most successful, this spray should be applied just before the buds swell in the spring. It can be used at this time stronger than later, and should be thrown upon the trees when it is warm.

Use for winter spraying, one pound to two gallons of water; for summer work use one pound to two gallons of water.

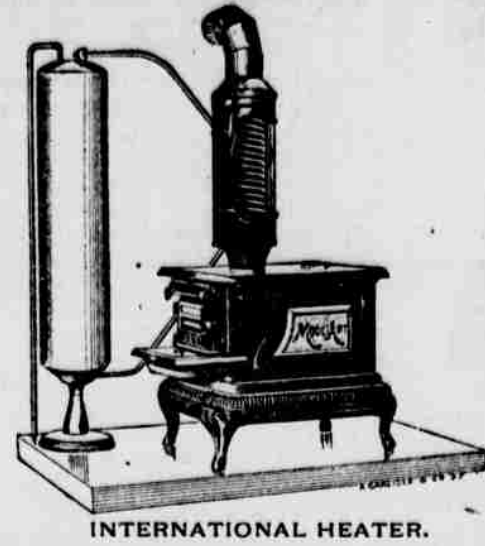

Secretary Alger has returned to Washington from Fort Monroe, greatly improved in health, and yesterday called on the president.

Latest advices state that the French republic is in immediate danger of a revolution. Freedom of speech and the press is a thing of the past in that republic.

The impression first given that the Maine was blown up by accident is fast giving away to the belief that the explosion was caused by a submarine mine.

The radical wing of the autonomist party in Cuba, under the leadership of Senor Govin, is rapidly becoming the dominating force in the administration of the government of the island. As a result the conservatives and Weyler's partisans are becoming more and more dissatisfied with the present regime. This factional strife, because of the possibility of its developing into an open rupture, constitutes one of the most serious menaces to Spanish domination in Cuba.
